Story of St. Valentine:

"The story of Valentine's Day begins in the third century with an oppressive

Roman emperor and a humble Christian Martyr. The emperor was Claudius II. The Christian was Valentinus.

Claudius had ordered all Romans to worship twelve gods, and had made it a crime punishable by death to associate with Christians. But Valentinus was dedicated to the ideals of Christ; not even the threat of death could keep him from practicing his beliefs. He was arrested and imprisoned.

During the last weeks of Valentinus's life a remarkable thing happened. Seeing that he was a man of learning, the jailer asked whether his daughter, Julia, might be brought to Valentinus for lessons. She had been blind since birth. Julia was a pretty young girl with a quick mind. Valentinus read stories of Rome's history to her. He described the world of nature to her. He taught her arithmetic and told her about God. She saw the world through his eyes, trusted his wisdom, and found comfort in his quiet strength.

"Valentinus, does God really hear our prayers?", Julia asked one day.

"Yes, my child, He hears each one."

"Do you know what I pray for every morning and every night? I pray that I might see. I want so much to see everything you've told me about!"

"God does what is best for us if we will only believe in Him," Valentinus said.

"Oh, Valentinus, I do believe! I do!" She knelt and grasped his hand.

They sat quietly together, each praying. Suddenly there was a brilliant light in the prison cell. Radiant, Julia screamed, "Valentinus, I can see! I can see!"

"Praise be to God!", Valentinus exclaimed, and he knelt in prayer.

On the eve of his death Valentinus wrote a last note to Julia, urging her to stay close to God. He signed it, "From your Valentine." His sentence was carried out the next day, February 14, 270 A.D., near a gate that was later named Porta Valentini in his memory. He was buried at what is now the Church of Praxedes in Rome. It is said that Julia planted a pink-blossomed almond tree near his grave. Today, the almond tree remains a symbol of abiding love and friendship. On each February 14, Saint Valentine's Day, messages of affection, love, and devotion are exchanged around the world."

Who is Father Matthew? Well, if you are a Stockton Ports fan, you may know him better as Grant Desme. Grant Desme was an

outfielder for the Stockton Ports in 2009. He was one of the top two prospects for the Oakland Athletics at that time. In January 2010, he made a phone call to the A's vice president of baseball operations, Billy Beane, to inform him that he was giving up baseball to follow the call of the priesthood. Beane, a Catholic himself, was speechless but respected his decision. Desme entered into St. Michael's Abbey of the Norbertine Fathers in Silverado, CA and is now in his seventh of a 10-year journey to the priesthood. Desme is an active Catholic and a baseball player all this life. It was when he got hurt and could not play for a year and a half that he felt a tug in his heart to consider a call to the priesthood. He decided to play one more season to discern this feeling. After that year as well as meeting a girl, these did not take away the tugging at his heart. So, he answered God's call.

Most of us probably do not have as colorful of an experience as Grant Desme, but we are all called to be something or to do something. We may not know this or choose not to want to know this, but God is not going to let us off the hook that easy. Just look at the examples in the Bible. God knows each one of us by name, and intimately, too, since He created us. So, He has plans for each one of us.

We are all called and called to a vocation. Most of us think of vocations as those to become priests or religious brothers and they certainly are, but they are not the only calls that God makes. As for me, I was called to become a deacon. This is not a calling that I would ever expect or think that I can do. I did not have the skills nor the talents to do it. 
